The Society for Musicology in Ireland (SMI) is committed to equal opportunity and fair representation for all its members and those who participate in its activities. At the heart of our mission lies a desire to cultivate a supportive and inclusive community in which colleagues are valued and treated respectfully.—The SMI upholds these ideals, both in terms of its administrative processes and scholarly outlook, by:

- Treating equally all members, volunteers, Council members, and members of the public with whom the society engages. In line with Ireland's Equal Status Acts, nobody should encounter discrimination on the following grounds: gender, marital status, family status, age, disability, sexual orientation, race, religion, membership of the Traveller community.
